He was fascinated by this place called Earth and you could often find him watching nature documentaries, listening to Stephen Hawking or reading National Geographic. His inner child, L.G. (Little Guy) often came out to play and would say and do the funniest things! He never lost his sense of humor or passion for life and lived the way he wanted to. He always said he was going to "Go big or go home!" and he always did!

Rich always used to joke and say he was a "Nobel Peace Prize Winner, Pulitzer Prize Winner, True Humanitarian and All Around Good Guy!" If you're here, it means you probably agree.
